

In 2024, the College of Literature, Science, and the Arts embarked on the Year of Sustainability, a theme year focused on climate action at the intersection of academics, operations, and engagement. The new LSA Sustainability team will continue this work moving forward through a strong focus on facilities and operations, engagement, and ongoing collaborations with Planet Blue partners.

SUSTAINABILITY GRANTS STILL AVAILABLE



After a successful 2024 grant cycle, funds for LSA staff, faculty, and students to pursue their ideas are now an annual opportunity! The Museum of Natural History is refreshing its Insect Hotel. The new lodging is designed specifically to support Michigan's native bees. Nontoxic UV-reflective paint will help bees orient and get back to their specific nest after foraging.

EARTH DAY 2025 RECAP

Interested in planting with us? Let our team know! LSA Sustainability celebrated Earth Day with a "Swag Swap" for excess promotional items, ran a plant-based dye station for the LSA End of Semester Bash, hosted a Climate Cafe with the City of Ann Arbor, and planted 2,100 new native plants behind the Undergraduate Science Building!

University & College Collaboration: Waste Reduction



In 2024, the Office of Campus Sustainability proposed <u>new waste reduction goals</u> based on campus waste audits, collecting community input, and workstream development with key stakeholders. These goals are:

- Reduce overall waste.
- Achieve 50% diversion rate by 2030 and a continued 2% increase every year after.
- Improvement of <u>SCIP</u> (Sustainability Cultural Indicators Program) waste indicators.
- Establish a reuse goal by 2030.

Here's a peek behind the scenes at how the LSA community is making this happen!

Campus Race to Zero Waste

The 2025 <u>U-M Campus Race to Zero</u> <u>Waste</u> winner was Lane Hall! Achieving an 83% diversion rate takes community effort, but the real superhero is Lane Hall custodian Archie Criglar, Jr. To understand what this win means to him and his enthusiasm behind waste diversion, you can read his Spotlight story <u>here</u>.

Chemistry Share-Ware Pilot

Led by Chemistry student Sheikh Nahiyan and funded through a grant from the <u>Sustainable Lab Summit</u>, this pilot allows groups in Chemistry to borrow "share-ware" items for student celebrations (candidacy, thesis). Items included in the "share-ware" library are plates, silverware, champagne flutes, etc.

Mobile Waste Education

Created by U-M undergraduate students, Jack Pribble and Nethra Yandooru, <u>Diag</u> <u>CARES</u> (Compost and Recycling Education Station) is a mobile educational waste collection system. It is housed in Haven Hall and has been used for LSA@Play events, helping organizers achieve a diversion rate of 99%!





Sustainable Operations

Becoming a sustainable LSA means embedding efficiency at all levels of our community and physical footprint. LSA Sustainability is part of the broader LSA Facilities & Operations Team, so our buildings are a key part of our strategy. This includes energy, water, physical materials, and making sure our spaces meet current and future needs.

Did you know?

When you submit a work order, you help us advance sustainability in our existing spaces by helping to **track and resolve maintenance** issues. Let us know if there is a leak, broken windows, or if a space is too hot or cold (under 68F or over 76F) consistently.

Renovations & New Projects

The <u>Board of Regents</u> <u>approved</u> the \$190M renovation project, where the building will be all-electric and is on path to become carbonneutral.



Department-Level Action

LSA Units & Departments leverage their unique expertise, insights, and interests to lead change across their operations and programming. Here are a few examples of new efforts launched since our last update.

EAST HALL FACILITIES TEAM: ZERO-WASTE STUDENT-LED IFTARS



The East Hall Atrium is a popular event space. During Ramadan, student leaders used the space to host zero-waste iftars as a community. To help support these students, the Office of Campus Sustainability and East Hall staff teamed up to store extra compostable materials and compost carts on site. This made transportation easier and ensured students could break their fast on time, together, and sustainably.

LLOYD SCHOLARS FOR WRITING AND ARTS YEAR OF SUSTAINABILITY MURALS



Remaking the Cretaceous

Later this spring, the Museum of Natural History will unveil its next Window Gallery exhibit visible from Washtenaw Avenue. While the display is new, the inspiration – and physical materials – are not. The ancient underwater scene is based on a classic diorama created by George Marchand and was previously displayed in the Ruthven Building.

The installation itself is primarily built, about 95%, from discarded building materials from LSA classrooms that went under renovation throughout 2024.

Getting Ready for the Bloom

The W.E. Upjohn Peony Garden at Nichols Arboretum is over a century old and is home to hundreds of individual specimens of peonies in 27 flower beds. <u>Peak bloom time</u> is typically around late May until early June. Enjoy an early morning walk, a lunch break, or an afternoon stroll!

Did you know that the W.E. Upjohn Peony Garden is the largest heirloom peony garden in North America? At peak bloom the garden holds nearly 800 peonies and over 10,000 flowers.

Earth Day at The Arb

Hosted by Matthaei Botanical Gardens and Nichols Arboretum, <u>Earth Day at The Arb</u> featured a full day of events with a number of activities led by LSA community members.
